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

WHAT A TEAM!

DISKETTE MAGAZINE REVIEW: UPTIME

This month's review is on a one-disk magazine called UPTIME. I demonstrated Volume 1, Number 5 at our November Club meeting. UPTIME follows the general theme of these disk magazines, providing a simple menu from which the user can choose the article or program desired.

This issue of UPTIME featured LIFE 88; a micro-universe generator that is a computer version of a complex bio-genetic model. The model can be modified in a variety of ways to test your own theories and see how they work in the model. Other programs include: TEST GENERATOR, which allows teachers to make up a test and have the students take it from the same program. Multiple choice, flex questions, and true/false can be used to make up your test; DISK LABELER prints disk directories directly on your disk sleeves for easy reading; DR. ED'S SECRET CODE will encode ASCII test files by scrambling and creating a new file which can then be unscrambled only by using your secret code; ANIMAL TRIVIA is a fun multiple choice quiz on animals; BATCH WRITER creates and edits DOS batch files; FILE EDITOR displays or prints ASCII or HEX files for information value or to make changes; ABC HELPER is a basic learning tool for the ABCs.

There is also the usual section for advertising, letters, software reviews, products, and tutorials.

UPTIME sells for \$14.95 for each issue. Subscriptions are available from UPTIME, P.O. Box 299, Newport, RI 02840. (6 issues for \$48; 12 issues for \$89.95). System requirements are: DOS 2.0 or higher; 256K RAM; PCjr compatible.

STREET SPORTS BASEBALL: EPYX is releasing a sports game with a bit of a twist; baseball with the 52nd Street Gang. All the standard functions of a baseball program are there. MARBLE MADNESS: For all you video junkies out there, ELECTRONIC ARTS has come out with an excellent version of the hit arcade game by the same name. Now, on a 256K Junior, you can hasten your entry to the funny farm as solving this game takes over your life. The object is to control the rolling of a marble down bizarre 3-D terrains, trying all the time to avoid wierd enemies and also trying to avoid falling off the cliff-edges of the raceways. Just a word of caution: play this game enough and you could end up with scrambled eggs for brains! (SELECTIVE SOFTWARE, Fall 1987)

PC-TALK OUT, BROWN BAG IN: HEADLANDS COMMUNICATIONS, CORP., maker of PC-TALK, one of the original shareware software programs, has decided to sell its latest version, PC-TALK 4, as a retail product, not as shareware. Registered users may upgrade for \$45. The retail price will be \$129. BROWN BAG SOFTWARE COMPANY recently announced that it is doing the reverse of HEADLANDS; getting out of the business of selling retail and instead, offering HOMEBASE, PC-OUTLINE, POWER MENU, BROWN BAG UTILITIES, GOAL SEEKER, and VSI WINDOWS as shareware, with the registration fees ranging from \$29.95 to \$129.95, depending on the program and related factors. ENTER THE DATE AND TIME!

After you turn on your PC, the first DOS message you have to reply to is:

Current date is Tue 1-01-1980
Enter new date (mm-dd-yy):

The next DOS message you will see is:

Current time is 0:00:12.51
Enter new time:

In both of these cases, do not just press Enter, be sure to enter the correct date and time. DOS uses the date and time in directory entries for files. Therefore, you can use the date and time to determine the latest version of a program or file. If you look at a typical disk directory, you will see tons of work done on New Year's morning of 1980. I guess these frantic people had to get all their work done that day.

It takes only five to 15 seconds to enter the current date and time. In the next two hours of work, these five to 15 seconds can save you a lot more time that you may have spent trying to determine which copy of XYZ.WK1 is the latest department budget. If you can't bring yourself to enter the current date and time, then buy a board with a clock-calendar. In your AUTOEXEC.BAT file, execute the program to GET the date and time from the board clock-calendar.

A related subject: After DOS finishes booting, you are ready to work. Before you can use blank diskettes, you must format them with the FORMAT command (program). Use the FORMAT option/V. This allows you to put an eleven-character label on a diskette. It takes only seconds to think up a meaningful label and type it in. When FORMAT requests the volume label, do not just press Enter. Instead, enter eleven meaningful characters; for example, BUDGET 1987, LOTUS 1-2-3. It is much easier and faster to look at the diskette volume label using the volume (VOL) command than to scroll through a spreadsheet looking for some clues to identify the 1987 budget. Leave a trail to show where you have been; give yourself a chance to figure out what happened two or three weeks or months ago.

Q. My Tecmar JrCaptain installed on my PCjr has been gaining time for an unknown reason. A thorough search of the manual fails to give me appropriate information regarding a re-set of the clock. Could you please help me? (B. Stewart, Monument, Colorado)

A. That's definitely a chicken and an egg problem. You can't set the new time because your original SETTIME routine causes your Junior to bypass the DOS time and date prompts. Fortunately, the solution is a simple one. Just at the A> type TIME which will give you your current incorrect setting, and a prompt for a new correct time setting. Once you accomplish that, you can run your SETTIME utility from your Tecmar software and you'll have the problem licked. (The Junior Report, 2/87)

NEWS FROM THE DISK LIBRARY

A program called BIBLEQ is now our Disk #25. BIBLEQ is a collection of multiple choice questions encompassing a wide range of Biblical knowledge. Much like Trivial Pursuit, BIBLEQ can be played by a small group and can lay the groundwork for a more broad base overall knowledge of the Bible. Unlike Trivial Pursuit, you can play BIBLEQ by yourself (but it's more fun with others).

You have your choice of four areas of knowledge: the Old Testament, the New Testament, the four Gospels, and Bible geography. Each topic has many questions and there is a total of 1,000 altogether. The questions and answers take up over 240,000 bites on the disk! It is hard to run out of questions on the lives and incidents of both the Old and New Testaments!

While it is easy to see where BIBLEQ would be great for teachers in a church-school setting, this program also has a place in nearly every home, regardless of your religious persuasion. No matter what your faith is, it is important to have a broad base knowledge of what you believe or where your neighbor is coming from. BIBLEQ will really aid you in your efforts in both areas.

BIBLEQ works well on a 128K Junior with one disk drive. If you have a color monitor, the Eugene PCjr Club version has a color program included to change your screen to any color you may desire. This additional program alone may be worth the price of the disk! It is very easily placed in a batch file for use in other programs besides BIBLEQ.

This is a program that we recommend you let the children play whenever your minister comes for a visit. The minister will join in with the kids and let you get on about your business. And if he or she likes it well enough, tell them about our quantity discount!

MY JUNIOR SAYS, "USEME"

As the Club's Librarian, my Junior sees a lot of use. It uses the FORMATAB program to format as many as a hundred diskettes at one sitting so we won't be selling any bad diskettes. Junior is three years old now, and he (um) has seen five year's worth of normal wear, especially on its (um) IBM original drive. We added the RACORE second disk drive a while back and have since found out quite a bit about things inside Junior which we never thought we would ever need or want to know.

Most of you are aware of my feelings towards RACORE's management. While my feelings are personal and do not reflect the general opinion of most RACORE owners (surely not), I really enjoy their product...once I have one of their ex-dealers get it going. But to get back on course...

My drive A is my original IBM drive and drive B is the one from RACORE. Interestingly, the only difference is the front plate; the plate that you see when looking at the front of the Junior. One says IBM on it and the other says R with six lines after it. This must be the RACCORE, and I suppose, the RAPPORT trademarks. I ordered my "enhancement" package from RACORE but the documentation was from both companies. At any rate, both of the floppy drives are Qume 142 drives; both the RACORE and the IBM.

Well, the bearings are going out on the Qume with the IBM face plate. I vocalized my problem and one of our members was nice enough to offer a Leading Edge drive, which he removed from his Junior clone when he upgraded one of his drives in his Leading Edge to a hard disk. Boy, was it ever a better drive than the Qume; at least, in the "beefiness." Unfortunately, while the color matched Junior much better than the black front the present drives have, the cables just wouldn't line up.

The next step was to take Junior over to ... (a computer store in Springfield). They will fix your computer at rock-bottom rates or there is no charge. Just my kind of company! We installed a total of six drives. Either they would work and the cables wouldn't line up, or they just wouldn't work at all; a "boot failure."

What to do? In some stuff that Dick Page had given me to return to Bill Roy, I came across an addendum to an article in a past publication which had carried an article on disk drives. "Make sure that the replacement drive has a 6 MS stopper motor and not a 12 MS one, as do most of the newer drives." A check with the Springfield repair person showed that, yep, that was the problem.

I received a Qume (complete with the IBM logo on the front) by mail order today, installed it, and it works just great. So, if you find the need to replace your drive and your local repair shop is having trouble doing the job for you, tell them to use a drive with a 6 MS stopper motor, whatever that is, and your problem may be cured. Or, if you are in the Eugene Club, call me and I will replace it for you; the total cost was less than \$80. If there is anything to be learned from all of this, it is the fact that we all need to share information and skills. Replacing drives in computers wasn't a necessary skill to be the Disk Librarian when Lew Jones gave me this job!



TYPE README

Sounds pretty straight, but is it? Most of the Shareware and Freeware (and even some high-dollar commercial software) we obtain today has either a README or a README file on them, which is supposed to get us off on the right track. But, let's think about the construction of this common file format. Just how "user friendly" is it?

I really hope that all of us know how to place a diskette into the drive and type DIR to see what is on the diskette. While I hope this, I realize that this is not the case. If you are one of those people who do not understand what has been written thus far, you are not alone, believe me. PLEASE call any of the members of the Club (or the Disk Librarian at 503/343-7592) and just say, I do not understand "TYPE DIR." You won't be the first to call. But, back to the README file.

The EUGENE PCjr CLUB realized that there was an industry-wide problem with the way computer software programs were to be initially started; or "booted," to use standard terms. Therefore, we began a uniform method for our members: to find out how a program began, all they had to do was type README.

What a can of worms! "README" led to the computer saying, "BAD COMMAND." TYPE "README" gives you "FILE NOT FOUND." "TYPE README" can get you an "ABORT, RETRY, IGNORE" message. (Pardon the punctuation, but DOS doesn't always adhere to a style manual).

When the disk says TYPE README, it means that at the A prompt (A>), you should type the following: TYPE README and then press the enter key or the carriage return key. This is known as the TYPE command. If you invoke TYPE [filename], Junior will find the file and will "type" it, or will copy it, to your screen.

Unfortunately, whatever file you have selected to TYPE will scroll by pretty rapidly. README goes by so fast that you really have to be into speed reading to read it. If you would like to pause the screen movement, you should press the FUNCTION key and then the A key, or the "pause" key. When you press this key, the screen will stop scrolling by until you press another key. This method is somewhat like typing DIR/P, where your directory listing will stop after the screen fills. Unlike DIR/P, the Function/Pause combination stops the screen scrolling as soon as you press the "pause" (A) key.

But there is still another way to look at the README file. You can load any word processing program and just call up the README file. If you do this, you can look it over, edit it if you wish to remove information you don't need, and then print it with your printer. This way, you will have a "hard copy" of the information in the README file. In fact, you can do this with most files that have DOC, TXT or BAT as their extensions (JRCLUB.DOC, PATCH.TXT, OR AUTOEXEC.BAT).

If you type TYPE JRCLUB.DOC when you have a disk in your drive that actually has the file JRCLUB.DOC on it, the file will be printed, or typed, to your screen. If you have a problem with this, PLEASE call us or write to us; we feel that it is very important that all Junior owners get full use from their investment.

Some of you may be saying to yourselves, "you gotta be kidding me." But, believe me, we are not kidding you. It is imperative that we all begin at the beginning. All of you, who are comfortable with \$p#g in your AUTOBATs at one time, were uncomfortable with TYPE README. When you can't read README, what good is it? As some folks upgrade their equipment from time to time, more and more Juniors are being sold on the used computer market. The EUGENE PCjr CLUB is an ongoing support group for many people who are new to the many ways that Junior can enhance their lives.

So, if you can't type README, come to the monthly meetings! And if you never type anything anymore because you have set up your system to use AUTOBATs, come to the monthly meetings, too! We need all of you!

Q. If I have two files and want to combine them into one file, can I do that by using DOS, or does that take a special program?

A. DOS can handle that job easily. It is one of the more obscure uses of the COPY command...which is really a very useful one. Here's an example: A> copy oldfile.one+oldfile.two newfile.doc. Do you see? Just use the COPY command, enter the two files--joined with a plus--you want combined, and then the name of the new one. Easy, huh? (Ventura IBM PCjr's User's Group, 6-86, Camarillo, CA)
