OCTOBER MEETING

The meeting this month was in three parts. The first part dwelt with dues. The treasurer, Greg Pietrucha, Greg Pietrucha, proposed setting up a new dues payment system for the club. After some discussion the club approved a payment program so that all present members of the club will have their dues due on January first and payable by the first meeting. Any present member paying late will still owe the \$12.00 for the year, and any new member joining will pay a prorated amount. This should simplify the bookkeeping a lot.

The second part dwelt with a report on the trip to the Atlanta CoCofest. Five of us six festers were at the meeting and we each gave a report on our impressions. More on this later.

The third part dwelt demos. There were three of them. The first one was a game called "Marty's Nightmare" a game from Steve Bjork written specifically and only for the CoCofest. It's a PacMan type game with a little human figure running through a maze wiping out dots and whenever it hit a chip a voice says, "I have a hardware problem." There are other items to run into and other comments. One item is a cup of coffee, with no comment, but the figure speeds up for a few seconds.

The second demo was a program called "Master Catalog (3)" a disk cataloging program. This is apparently an upgrade to the CoCo3. From what was said and shown there has been a great improvement. The person doing the demo (Sorry I didn't get the name.) said that when he used the old program and had a lot of disks to catalog he could start the sorting process and that maybe 10 to 12 hours later it would be done. It did the job but it was slow. During the demo the demonstrator made enough copies of a sample disk to put around a 150 files in memory and then he did a sort that was over in about 30 seconds. Also each disk was copied very quickly. The program seems to be a very fine one for cataloging your disks. I see by the ad in The Rainbow that the program has some other features, it is sold by Second City Software for \$19.95, and the CoCo 1 & 2 version is available also. If you need or want to catalog your disks this could be a program for you.

The third demo was the "Coloring Book." This is a new program for the CoCo3 and I think it takes 512k of memory. It is for children from ages 3 to 7. I think the program has some impressive qualities that are hard to describe and are better shown. A set of pictures comes with it and some others set will be coming in the future including the alphabet, animals, etc. It's just like a coloring book except it is on

the computer. The child can learn the same as a coloring book and at the same time begin to learn how to use a computer. This program is also sold through Second City Software.

As you can read this months meeting was a full one.

This group is small at this time and very informal. In spite of this and with no newsletter or announcement of meetings a few of us manage to make it to meetings held of the fourth Thursday of the month at the Glenside Public Library.

At this meeting we had our first view of the MM/1. It was model number 0000 or 0001 as I would prefer. This is the one designed by Kevin Pease and it was his machine. It had two boards, a 3" 40 meg hard drive, and a 3" floppy and could be contained is a case about the size of one that could contain two full height floppy drives. It didn't have the nice look that the MM/1 will have when it is bought from IMS, and it didn't have all of the software that is suppose to come with the machine.

It did, however, have the professional OS-9 operating system and a few other programs. Some impressions I have from that short experience are that the operating system has all of the same modules that come with Level-II but with a lot more options for each of them plus some modules that don't come with Level-II. It did have windows like the CoCo3 except they are graphics screens and that you move from screen to screen by pressing a single key for that screen, that way you don't have to go through say five screen to get to the one you want. The

machine is fast compared to the CoCo and we were able to play some digitized sounds with it.

This is the first time I have known that the MM/1 has only graphics screens, and I wondering what this might mean in the future. I read some place that consumer electronic products will become more and more computer oriented, meaning that some computers will be electronic products Walkmans. Just possibly the with its graphics capabilities will be a step in that direction from computer side. For one reason, the 68070 chip is from the Phillips Corporation which is one of the big backers and developer of Compact Disk Interactive a computer based video system for the home user market. For another reason Interactive Media Systems, maker of the MM/1, keeps touting the graphics capabilities of their machine. I am very interested in the possibilities.

NOVEMBER MEETING

The really, really, really big news from this meeting is that Ed Hathaway, the president, will be leaving. His wife has received wonderful a opportunity for her career in Greensboro, NC. This means, of course, that the club has to prepare to go on, and to find somebody to replace Ed. I think he will be hard to replace because he has had so much to do with the success of the club as far as I can tell. Ed won't be leaving until after January first so the club does have until then to get things set up to continue. The important first step will to nominate and elect a new president and that will start and perhaps finished in the December meeting.

I hope the club can work things out because it is still a very active club, and it is also the club that is the guest host to the Rainbowfest.

ARTICLES

ATLANTA COCOFEST by Howard Luckey

If you have been reading these newsletters you know that I went to the Atlanta CoCofest October 6 & 7.

I loved the fest. From the first Rainbowfest that I went to a few years ago, to now I have really enjoyed them. Compared to other computer shows the fests are smaller, I know some of the people involved, and I love the CoCo.

Eight of us went to this fest in two cars. In car one, ladies and gentlemen, we have Hathaway, the owner of Second City Software, president of the Glenside club and a vendor at the fest; Chris Hawk, programmer, hardware person, club member and owner of Hawksoft; Kevin Pease. programmer, hardware person and chief designer of the MM/1; Mike Knudsen programmer, club member and author of UltiMusE III, the ultimate music editor for the CoCo3; and myself, club member. In car two we have Gene Brooks, club member, hardware person, his son Dan a budding artist; and Eddie Kuns, PhD. candidate, co-manager of the CoCo SIG on Delphi, programmer, author of KBCOM a level II communication program, and club member.

The trip down was very nice. We did get started about two hours late, and since the trip is about fifteen hours we got to Atlanta around 10:30 PM Illinois time or 11:30 PM their time. Fortunately the people sponsoring the fest were still in the showroom so that we were able to move stuff needed by Second City for their booth from the car to the room so that things could be set up first thing in the morning. On the way down I did hear a lot of conversation about the MM/1 and some of the personalities

involved in bringing it to market.

The structure and format of the fest was pretty much like the fests sponsored by The Rainbow. There were twenty three vendors including the Atlanta Computer Society, and twelve seminars. The vendors included some of the old standbys such as Burke and Burke, Dansoft, CocoPro, and others, and some new ones as Peripheral Technologies, Carl England, and others. In addition to exhibitors there were twelve seminars. In my opinion the sponsoring club did a very good job of setting up the seminars and making sure that they all went smoothly. I attended nine of the seminars. I am not going to report on everyone of them here. I will report on the ones in which I learned something new.

One of them was the one given by Ed Hathaway about desktop publishing on the CoCo. Ed is in the business of desktop publishing and I found presentation informative about that kind of publishing and also about using the CoCo. Ed gave some of the principles of making presentable documents, and mentioned some of software available for CoCo. One thing I was surprised about is that we CoCo people can use a laser printer with at least one of the DTP packages and that is Newspaper Plus. It was a job well done.

Another interesting seminar given by a representative from the Chicago area was the one given by Mike Knudsen the author of UltiMusE III the music editor for the CoCo3 under OS-9. Mike's seminar was very well attended and he did a good job of demo-ing program especially showing the enhancements in the latest upgrade. Unfortunately I am not that well versed in music so that a lot of what presented I didn't understand. I have learned that quite a few professional in the music business are using the editor

with its ability to do MIDI with the CoCo-3. I was impressed.

A completely different seminar was the one given by Phil Anzalone from Signetics, the company that makes the 68070 chip. His presentation was quite technical and a bit beyond my level of knowledge. For those who are interested I will bring some of the handouts to our next meeting and you can take a shot at understanding them. From what Phil said the chip and extensions of it have a lot of capabilities.

Another very interesting meeting was the one lead by Cray Augsburg, managing editor of The Rainbow and Greg Law, technical editor. The topic was "What the Future Holds in the Pages of Rainbow." Items of interest include: a request to stop rumors they only hurt the magazine and the community, subscriptions have gone up in the last month or two, the magazine will continue to have decent number of pages committed to OS-9, the Chicago Rainbowfest is still on, there is a triangle of the Rainbow, vendors, and us the users which does not include There was additional conversation later in the evening after dinner.

Another different seminar was the one called SURPRISE!!!. The presenter was suppose to be Doctor Marty Goodman. He never made it, so the sponsors organized an impromptu session involving the three computer companies (That's right three.). Two of them we know about, Frank Hogg Labs with the TC9 and the kbus, Interactive Media Systems, Inc. and the MM/1. The 'new one is Peripheral Technology. have been making 68K computers for a number of years and just now moving into the CoCo community. Each of the companies talked about their computers and suggested that each of should make our own decisions about which one is right for us. Say, there's a

new idea. One thing I found very interesting is the the person from Peripheral Technology mentioned something about beginning to advertise in The Rainbow. He said that they do very little advertising in print and rely mainly on word of mouth. I believe all of this add a lot excitement to the CoCo community, and I hope we can continue to grow.

The seminars of seminars for a lot of the attendees was the one held by Kevin Darling on OS-9/OSK. This one started at 6:00 PM on Saturday and was open ended as far as time. I don't know when it ended after I had been there about two hours because most of our group went to supper. Kevin had a lot of war stories about the CoCo, OS-9, the development of the new computers and the writing of a windows interface for them. One story was about how a Pontiac plant in Michigan used a CoCo for a week when the OS-9 computer broke down and the didn't want to wait for it to be repaired. A most important item for many of us with CoCos is that the OS-9 upgrade that Kevin and others developed just become available. Apparently when Tandy dropped the CoCo the person that could have given the go ahead to offer the product was no longer around. I hope this turns out to be true.

Well that is some of the stuff about the fest, if you want to hear more come to our next meeting on October 24th. In the future I will demo some of the software I bought one being "La Belle Lucie."

The fest ended on Sunday at 3:00 PM (2:00 PM our time) and we didn't leave until about 5:30 PM our time because Kevin Pease had to do some hardware hacking with the other Kevin. I never did find out what it was all about. The trip back was a lot different because for most of the time we had clouds and rain and we were mighty tired. In fact we stopped just south of Indianapolis and slept a

little bit. Doing that didn't help me that much. I got home about 12:00 PM Monday.

OS-9 Disk Mailing List

A REVIEW

The program:

OS-9 Disk Mailing List dml9

The company:

Bob van der Poal Software PO BOX 355 PORTHILL ID 83853

The price: \$24.95

The features of the package include the following: names sorted at all times, immediate access to any name even in large files, ability to create formats for labels and printing lists, able to set parameters for output by alphabet or alphabet and zip code, and sorting can be maintained by name and zip. The program can handle a mailing list as large as you can hold on your system (absolute max of 30,000) but 5000 names is the maximum recommended size.

I have used this program but for a very small mailing list, our club, so I have never tested it to its limits. By the way the program does require a CoCo3 with 512K of RAM and the Level-2 OS-9 operating system.

You start the program by typing dm19 on the command line. Then the program searches current data directory files ending with ".DMLdata." These files are mailing lists and there can be up to nine of them at one time. Once these are detected the program presents a small menu from which you can select which list you want to work on plus the option C to change directories or N to start a new file. Then the screen clears and in the

upper left corner and in reverse video the following menu appears:

A, I, F, L, M, S, C, W, R, O, X

These letters mean, in order, Add names, Intensive search, Find record, List or report, Merge with ASCII file, file Statistics, Change print mask, Write current mask, Restructure file, Open new file, and exit mailer. The Find record has a submenu for moving through the list for deleting, editing and printing individual records. A nice feature of all of the menus is that if you hit any letter not on it a help window is shown which lists the menu and gives a statement of what each letter means. A selection can be made from there.

When you select A you have a chance to enter the First name:, Last name:, Address:, City;, State/prov;, Country:, Zip code:, Phone:, and Memo:.

These are listed from the top of the screen to the bottom and while on an item there is a reverse video area open for editing your input. Each space can be edited using arrow keys and combinations of shift, control and arrow keys.

After making the entries a submenu appears allowing you to Edit this entry, Continue adding records, and X for Exit to the main menu.

Oops! I just found out how to get a fatal OS-9 error and exit the program. As I am writing this I have dml9 running in another window. I typed in a scratch name, entered into my list of names and then tried to delete it. This is part of the submenu for the Find option. I keyed y for yes and hit the enter key, and that was my mistake. Once you respond to a question just wait for program to work. A caution about delete is that it cannot be restored, but the space is kept and used when new records are entered.

Anyhow, once the list is set up you will want output and this is done with the L command. Here there are quite a few options as to which records to access. This is done by asking for "data for matching" and the options can be by first name, or last name, or city, etc plus operators such as =, <, >, !, -, and combinations of these so as to get just the records you desire. The output can be to the screen, which is nice so that you can see if you are getting what you want before printing, or to the printer. The format of the output is determined by the print mask you are using. Here again there are many options so that you can print mailing labels, names and phone numbers, names and address, etc. These masks can be edited, saved, rewritten, and reused.

With the above I think I have given you and idea of the main features of dml9. I have out some of the finer details that make this a very fine program for what it does. The documentation is on regular sheets of paper printed on one side, in double columns, and I found it adequate. I struggle a bit with learning the process of how to select which records to print and in the process of setting up print masks. Perhaps more examples would be useful especially examples that would show you what the output will look like once you have done what you think wanted to do. On the other hand at this price I don't expect to have fancy documentation.

This product would be very useful of anyone with a large mailing list such as a group, church, or a small business, and I recommend it.

Ah, my first review, any feedback from you will be appreciated.






