

Since Joe Register was apart of the Delphi network the day the CoCo-III was announced, he passed along to the membership that information he received. There were allot of questions being asked by the members and Joe did his very best to answer every one of them. The bulk of the question were centered around the extra memory, display and the OS-9 Level II screen operating system. With Joe's extensive computer background, he was able to field these questions and draw comparisons to other computer systems. On behalf of the Club, thanks Joe for a job well done.

ONE TANDY CENTER

I have seen on local BBS Boards where people are complaining about the CoCo-III and what Tandy will or will not support with this new system. Please allow an outsider to explain some of these reasons and statements. First of all, I do not work for Tandy and my only investment with Tandy is as an end user of The bulk of the their Color Computer. complaining is centered around memory and graphics availability in the CoCo-III. Tandy has said that there is only so much memory and only so much graphics space on the CoCo-III that they will support. in fact there is much more available space with in these locations. What Tandy really means is that they will only support these requirements and nothing else. Let's be honest guys, what Tandy supports and what Tandy built are for the most part two different systems. Tandy MUST maintain system standards and the applications that are designed around that system. With out this STANDARD of system support there would little or no software or hardware consistency. With out this little control of consistency, chaos would reign supreme! Let's go back not to long ago when the CoCo I & II were all we had. Tandy set standards for these systems and any deviation from these standards would not be supported as future hardware up grades came available. Thus the reason for CoCo Max, Micky Term or ADOS not being able to work with These companies wrote software CoCo-III. that ventured into the land of no return. Their designs called for ROM calls that were not ment to be used in the manner in which they were used. This did not mean that what they designed would not work it just ment that Tandy would not support them at retail or in future up grades. That's the real bottom line!



All of this is not to suggest that this editor has gone soft to Tandy. Nor is it to suggest that this Newsletter will not tackle and take on the wrongs or mistakes we find in future Tandy hardware or software. It is to suggest that what we know the ne CoCo-III is capable of doing, will be done. If it stays with in the constraints Tandy set, 'ok! If it does not then we also know the consequece.


XMODE /TERM TYPE=1 -UPC (ENTER)
Once you have completed this, type in
COBBLER /DO. This will save this patch onto
your system disk and everytime you BOOT up
OS-9, you will be in true upper & lower


COMPUTER WORLD
